
Eye Problems

Eye conditions are common, and can be painful and/or affect vision. Common signs of eye problems include: discharge, squinting, redness, cloudiness, vision loss.

EXAMINATION

In addition to a general physical and ocular examination, your pet may require some/all of the following tests to help diagnose the problem:

Conjunctivitis	Treatment depends on the underlying cause; options include anti-inflammatories, anti-virals, antibiotics, lubricants, calendula tea. Chronic or unusual cases may be referred to an eye specialist.	1. 2. 3.	N/A
Corneal Ulcers	Most corneal ulcers will heal quickly in 5-7 days with standard treatment consisting of pain relief, antibiotic ointment/drops, and prevention of self trauma. Some pets will require atropine drops to keep the pupil dilated. With infected or slow healing ulcers, or other concurrent eye concerns, referral to an eye specialist may be recommended. In some cases, pets will require minor or major surgery to help the ulcer to heal.	1. 2. 3.	Referral to specialist: Location: Date: Time:
Dry Eye	Medical management is achieved with immune suppressing eye medications such as cyclosporin or tacrolimus. Medical therapy is life-long. Tear replacement/lubrication is also required. Some cases require surgery (e.g. parotid duct transposition - using a salivary duct to improve lubrication of the eye).	1. 2. 3.	Referral to specialist: Location: Date: Time:
Entropion	In most cases eyelid surgery is required. Some cases require treatment of the concurrent conjunctivitis.	N/A	Surgery Information: Location: Date: Time:
Glaucoma	Management with medications to reduce the pressure and reduce pain, with ongoing monitoring. Some cases will benefit from referral to an eye specialist. Surgery is an option for some patients (laser destruction of some of the fluid producing cells within the eye; and/or treatment of concurrent issues such as a luxated lens).	1. 2. 3. Uveitis	Treatment of the underlying cause, if applicable. Reducing inflammation and pain within the eye is very important, and topical steroids or non-steroidal anti-inflammatories are prescribed.
